DAPP YOUNG FARMERS CLUBS

DAPP Malawi in partnership with the Central East African Railways (CEAR) and Vale started an agricultural project which is aiming at creating sustainable development through vocational and entrepreneurial training among 1000 young farmers in Chikwawa, Mwanza, Neno, Balaka and Machinga Districts.

The main objective of the project is to contribute to the economic empowerment and poverty alleviation among young men and women through organising and training them in sustainable conservation agriculture - and link them up to markets for selling of their produce. The trained young farmers will build their capacity not only to improve their own lives but also to contribute to improved livelihood for their families.

The focus of Young Farmers' Clubs program is to enable young farmers make qualified decision about taking up farming as their livelihood, to increase knowledge to young farmers using techniques of modern conservation farming and food utilization in the target area, to increase food production among young farmers in the targeted communities, to increase the family income and enhance social integration and to improve the living conditions of the affected communities through the provision and upgrading of basic infrastructure and services

So far, the district officials, stakeholders and local leaders have promised to work together with DAPP and Vale during the implementation of the project in order to empower the young farmers so that they take up the responsibilities inorder to improve their livelihoods.

Here are some testimonies from Agnes Chipamba, who is now teaching in Lilongwe Rural West and Ireen Chipondeponde, teaching at Midzembe Primary School, Neno have both joined the network of graduated DAPP graduated teachers called the "400 Primary School Program".

"The pass rate at my school for the first term was lower compared with the 2nd and 3rd term. The pass rate has been raised with 30% in each term," said Ireen.

As for Agnes she said she participates in sports activities to motivate lerners in her school. "I take part in the sporting activities myself and the learners because they like when we do things together."

The idea of the network is to enhance the skills of the DAPP graduates and support them in spearheading changes which make the entire school environment childfriendly and inclusive. The participation is solely on voluntary basis.

The DAPP graduates teachers are not only focusing on improving education and learning outcomes in their own classes - but share and pass on experiences to their fellow teachers.
