“Although our main focus is to train teachers for rural Malawi primary schools and equip adolescent girls and young women with tailoring and entrepreneurial skills, we also have to involve the students in environmental conservation because issues of global warming are universal,” said head of the Satellite project at Dowa TTC center Martha Mustafa.

PUTTING SKILLS TO PRACTICE

On 14 February 2019, DAPP Chilangoma Teachers Training College’s (TTC) student teachers, enrolled in 2018, organized an Open day together with primary school learners from Khungulu school in Chigumukile zone, in South West Education Division in Blantyre district.

Held under the theme “My Learner My Profession,” the activity had been organised to provide a platform for the student teachers to showcase various skills and talents acquired during their interactions with teachers and learners at the school.

“This day had been organized by student teachers after they completed one of the periods of the teaching course which gives them the opportunity to teach and interact with learners from standard 1 to 4. After this, they are expected to have an Open day to showcase what they have taught their learners” said Gibson Abner a Lecturer and Project Leader at DAPP Chilangoma Teachers Training College.

About 139 learners from Khungulu primary school together with their teachers participated in the event. DAPP Malawi has 4 TTC’s namely Chilangoma in Blantyre, Amalika in Thyolo, Mzimba in Mzimba and Dowa in Dowa.

Development Instructors are international volunteers that work with DAPP Malawi through its four Teachers Training Colleges in areas of education, agriculture, health, community development and climate change.

In Thyolo district, Thunga education zone, the Development Instructors working with DAPP Amalika Teachers Training College have facilitated the construction of classroom blocks for Ngomano and Mlambala Preschools. The rooms will accommodate about 30 pupils from the surrounding communities.

EQUIPING YOUTH WITH SKILLS TO BECOME SELF-RELIANT

“When I joined this course, I thought it would be hard, but now, I am proud to say I have made my first shoe design using a template made out of paper”, Says Edith Albert who is one of the students who enrolled into the Shoe making course at DAPP Mzimba Teachers Training College (TTC) in January. With funds from Sympany Netherlands, DAPP Malawi is implementing a Cobber/Shoe Making training project which aims at improving the social economic status of young people between the ages of 15 and 25 through equipping them with knowledge and skills in shoe making.

In February 2019, DAPP Mzimba TTC commenced the training of 20 new students enrolled into the Shoe Making course.

The students are now producing their first products comprising of different shoe designs made from template's made out of paper.

The Shoe Making course in Mzimba is an extension of the project by Mikolongwe Vocational school to reach out to more youth with technical and entrepreneurial skills in Malawi.

It is also being implemented by DAPP Mikolongwe Vocational School to equip 225 youth with Cobber/Shoe making skills by 2020 with funding assistance from Sympany of Netherlands.
